

Immigration

- In the late 1800's and early 1900's millions of immigrants journeyed to America on steamship which were less cheaper than sailing ships
- In 1892 Ellis Island opened putting immigration under the control of federal government
- From Europe, Asia and other parts of the world majority from Italy, Russia,
 Poland, Spain and Greece
- Included women, men and children
- More than 12 millions immigrants wanted to experience a better life in North
 America

Why Ellis Island?

- Ellis Island is a land in New York harbor which lies about
 1.6kilometers South west of Manhattan
- It was big enough to contain the large crowds of immigrants that were expected to arrive everyday

IMMIGRATION ISLAND



- For some Jewish
 Immigrants the trip was miserable, crowdy and uncomfortable. Beds were way down at the bottom of the bunk
- Wealthy people stayed in private staterooms and cabins
- Third class people stayed in the steerage

Time Frame and Challenges

- Took 2 to three weeks
- 3000 people packed in the same ship
- People spoke different languages and practised different religion
- Fear of being deported due to diseases or lack of money
- Family separations
- Corruption
- Hostile staff during medical screening

What were they escaping?

- Violent wars from home
- Religious Persecutions
- Political reasons
- Famine for example the Great Famine in Ireland between 1846 and 1851

Positive Impacts of Immigrants

- Growth of the American population
- Brought in new cultures and new languages
- Worked in different jobs

What does Ellis Island represent today?

- In 1965 there was an onset of new period of mass immigration, Ellis Island has been under jurisdiction of the National Park service
- Now Ellis Island represents a patriotic sentiment as tourist come in everyday to experience the life that immigrants went through
- Ellis island was not used anymore when a strong legislative policy started being used in 1954 because it was considered not useful anymore
